Willandra Lakes Region World Heritage Area

After ten years of drought we find our region transformed by above average spring rains. While in recent years some of our world heritage landholders have struggled to produce crops for lack of rain, the current challenge is finding a dry enough window of opportunity to harvest bumper crops. I hope the latest wet weather has not diminished crop quality too much and that the rest of the harvest can continue uninterrupted. On more than one occasion we have had to postpone planned events at Mungo because of road closures, including the launch of the Visitor Centre upgrade. We are now looking at a date in early March to celebrate the refurbishment. Feedback from visitors on the improvements has been fantastic and we are already finding ways to get the best out of the new facilities making the Mungo experience even more enjoyable. The end of October saw us hosting the Australian World Heritage Indigenous Network meeting, (relocated to Broken Hill because of rain!) which brought Traditional Owners from other world heritage areas together to discuss issues of mutual concern and share successes. It was a fantastic gathering and a great opportunity to share ideas and form networks. We stayed on in Broken Hill for the National

Indigenous Land & Sea Conference where we gave presentations of the visitor centre upgrade and on the Mungo Youth Project initiative. We subsequently gave a longer presentation on the Mungo Youth Project to the Dare to Lead Conference in Sydney. This conference brought school principals together from all over Australia focussed on improving outcomes for indigenous students, and our presentation advocated a much stronger of integration of aboriginal cultural history and 'deep time' in the National Curriculum.

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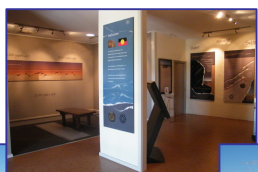
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NATIONAL PARKS LOWER DARLING AREA

Another year has swept by this one will be particularly remembered for the drought breaking rains.

For many years we have been amused by stories of people visiting Lake Mungo for boating or other water sports this year was different! An incredible 548.2 mm has been recorded for Mungo NP. (*Mildura has received 598.2mm the long term average annual rainfall is 282.9*) Many meetings and events such as the proposed Opening of the new interpretation were postponed or moved to other locations. "Plan B i.e. what if it rains" gained a more serious discussion and prominence throughout this year. Hopefully next year the rains will fall at all the right times and Turlee Station Stay & Mungo Lodge won't be impacted by Plan B!

In 2010 we welcomed new staff to the Mungo NP team; Kenny Clark, Peter Lawson and Lawrence Slade. NPWS Lower Darling Area staff are proud to have completed or contributed to some wonderful achievements in 2010 these include:

- Mungo interpretation upgrade of Visitor's Centre and new meeting place;
- Prescribed burning northern section of Mungo NP;
- Slashing and grading of fire trails and fire access tracks;
- Ongoing pest plant and animal control;
- Plague locust control;



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- Road works – major and minor repairs to the internal roads;
- Installation and fit out of additional staff quarters in Mungo works yard;



- Further development of the Discovery program with more tours and activities outside of the school holidays
- Flora and fauna research and monitoring – including the annual kangaroo population survey and monitoring of threatened Acacia species regeneration;
